B.HUMAN RESOURCES

1. Historical Growth of Population

In 1903, Teresa was only a barrio of Antipolo with a population of 1,683. It became a municipality in 1939 where the population grew to 2,425, or only an increase of 742 persons in a span of 36 years. It accelerated in 1970 when it registered a 6.65% growth rate. In 1975, the municipality posted its highest average growth rate of 7.38% with a total population of 13,394. In 1980, the growth rate decreased sharply to 1.99%. After 15 years, a total of 5,684 population was added for a total of 20,645 and was declared as total urban area by the National Statistics Office. The population more than doubled to 44,436 in 2007 (Table 1).

The increasing economic activities in Teresa, particularly the location of industrial and agro-industrial establishments in the area such as cement and quarrying establishments as well as poultry and piggery farms contributed to the increasing growth pattern. Moreover, Teresa's proximity to growth centers such as Metro Manila and Antipolo made the municipality a catchment area for their spillover population. This can be manifested in the increasing number of subdivisions in the municipality. Teresa's population growth rate, however, is expected to increase in the coming years due to the mushrooming of low and middle income residential subdivisions and socialized housing as well.

2. Population Size

As of 2010 census, Teresa registered a total population of 47,163 and 10,597 households (Table 2). Dalig is the most populated barangay with 9,501 population followed by Bagumbayan with 9,099 and Dulumbayan with 7,108. Calumpang/Sto.Cristo is the least populated barangay with 1,522 inhabitants.

The population of Teresa is equal to 1.90% of the 2, 484,840 total population of the province (Table 3). Teresa is the third smallest municipality in Rizal in terms of population count, following Jalajala and Baras. Its growth rate from the period 2000-2010 is 4.72 which is second highest among the city/municipalities in Rizal province next to Rodriguez.

3. Population Density




Figure 1. Population Density Map, 2010

The population density of Teresa is 22 persons per hectare (Table 4 and Figure 1). Calumpang/Sto. Cristo has the highest population density with 96 persons per hectare. Dalig and Dulumbayan are the least dense areas with nine (9)) persons/hectare and 18 persons/hectare respectively.

4. Population Distribution By Age Group, School Going Age, and Gender


The municipality of Teresa boasts of a young population. In 2007, the biggest age group was the 5-9 age group followed by the 1-4 year old category with 5,523 and 4,174 population count respectively (Table 5). The age group with the lowest population is the 80 and over age group with 210 population.

The total dependency ratio is 90 dependents per 100 persons. The young dependency ratio is 85:100 while the old dependency ratio is 4:100.

Like most population pyramid in most parts of the country, Teresa has a broad base, that is, a very large proportion of population belongs to younger age groups. This kind of population pyramid is said to have a very high fertility since new births are naturally added to the bottom, producing a broad-based age and sex distribution (Figure 3).

In 2007, the number of males (50.80%) was slightly higher than the female (49.20%) in all age group population (Table 5). For the school going age population, there are 125 males for every 100 females. There are 102 males for every 100 females in the labor force or working age group (Table 6).

5. Labor Force

There were 27,307 persons who are in the working age as of 2007. Of this statistics, 57.4% are employed and 42.6% unemployed (Table 7). In the whole province of Rizal, 56.1% are employed and 43.9% unemployed. It should be noted that the 16-20 school going age group is still included in these figures.

Locally, Teresa has 15,666 gainful workers 15 years old and over who are mostly from 25 to 29 years old bracket (Table 8). Sixty five percent (65%) are males who mainly worked as laborers and skilled workers. Some other occupations are trade and related workers (16%) and plant and machine operators and assemblers (13%).

There are 8,306 of this group who are working in this municipality and 3,096 are working in other provinces.

6. Population Projection

In computing the annual growth rate, **the 2000 and 2010 populations were used as base years**. The projected population obtained for 2010 is closer to the actual 2010 population. It is also more practical to use this data because it was based on the 10 years movement of population. However, the complete details on 2010 census on population and housing, as of this writing, is not yet available to the public.

6.1Municipal Population Projection

The population of Teresa is expected to increase in the coming years due to the mushrooming of low- and middle-income residential subdivisions and socialized housing as well. Due to its proximity to Manila, the municipality is the natural catchment area for the spillover population of Metropolitan Manila following Cainta, Taytay and Antipolo.

In this view, if the population continues to increase using the annual population growth rate of 4.7%, the population by 2013 is projected to reach 54,041 and 85,844 by 2023 (Table 10).



6.2 Projected Yearly Population by Barangay

Dalig has the highest population in Teresa and projected to reach 21,930 by 2023. This is followed by Bagumbayan with 21,593 by 2023. By that same year, the least populated barangay, Calumpang Sto. Cristo, will have a population of 3,426.

7.Crude Birth Rate (CBR) and Crude Death Rate (CDR)

The crude birth rate and death rate also affects the changes of the population. It may be noted that there are more births than deaths that occurred in 2007-2012 as is the normal order of things (Table 14). In 2008, the CBR did not change but the CDR decreased by 25% or one person per 1,000 population. Year 2009 has the highest increase of CBR. CBR slowly declined in 2010 by 4%, in 2011 by 12.50% and in 2012 by 9.52%.

8. Other Population Characteristics

8.1 Marital Status

In 2007, most married females belong to age group 35 - 39 with 1,338 females (Table 15). This was followed by females belonging to 30-34 age group at 1,304. It is also recorded that in this year, those belonging to common law or live-in status are within the age group 20-24 with 305 females, followed by age group 25-29 with 234 females.

8.2 Religious Affiliations
